December 5/6, 2020

2nd Sunday of Advent

“Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his path.” -- Mark 1:3

In “preparing the way of the Lord” we are called to live lives worthy of what God calls us to be. We are called to be grateful for and generous with the gifts that God has given us, and live as an example for others. Living a life of stewardship means not only being responsible for oneself, but for others as well.

December 12/13, 2020

3rd Sunday of Advent

“Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus.” -- 1 Thessalonians 5:16 – 18

Rejoice, pray and give thanks. These are very important words. In this passage, Paul tells us that we should rejoice in the gifts that God has given to us and place our trust that He will provide for us. Praying unceasingly means that we should have This scripture reading sums up Stewardship. “Rejoice always” means place your trust in God; He will provide all that you need. “Pray constantly” means that we should have regular conversations with God, asking for direction and guidance. “Give thanks” means that we should thank God for all things – good and not-so-good.

4th Sunday of Advent
