Let MI Kids Learn

In the spring of 2022, along with dioceses across the state and the Michigan Catholic Conference, we asked members of our community to support the Let MI Kids Learn (LMKL) petition drive. The petitions in part would have allowed children from low-income families to qualify for "Student Opportunity Scholarships" toward their out-of-pocket educational costs at public or nonpublic schools for tutoring, school supplies, computers, and tuition, among other expenses.

Due to the shifting balance of power as a result of the recent elections in the state legislature, Let MI Kids Learn has decided to withdraw the two petitions, essentially bringing this process to a close. More information can be found <a href="https://example.com/here.com

ACCREDITATION



Every Catholic school in the diocese is accredited through the Michigan Non-public School Accrediting Association, a service of Michigan Association of Non-public Schools. Schools conduct internal audits every third year of a five-year cycle. Every five years,

each school is reviewed and audited by other educators based on the National Standards and Benchmarks for Effective Catholic Schools.

Three schools will have a site visit this spring. The site visits also provide objective confirmation of the great things that are currently occurring within the school as well as possible opportunities for growth. The findings from the site visit are then incorporated in annual school improvement goals moving forward.

The Catholic Community Foundation of Mid-Michigan disbursed almost \$500,000 for Catholic education in 2022, with more than \$134,000 in stipends for Catholic school teachers.



Curriculum + Catholic Identity

Theology curriculum

One of the first priorities of the Catholic school initiative was and is to update our theology curriculum. Krista Willertz, Catholic identity and curriculum coordinator, has been working diligently to assess the various tools and resources that are currently being used in our schools. She has also been exploring best practices from other dioceses around the state and nationally.

In the second semester, we will be exploring the curricula from four other dioceses and creating a team of local experts (theology teachers, administrators and the diocesan staff theologian) to compare our current curriculum with that the four other dioceses. A robust, updated curriculum will be ready by this June to share with teachers for the 2023-24 school year.

School leaders retreat

In February, the Office of Catholic Schools will be hosting an overnight retreat for school leaders and associated pastors/directors of parish life. These leaders so often put others first before themselves. We are excited to be able to support this group in such an important way that it is so connected to our missions. The theme is "Come, be renewed."

Just as we evangelize to our students, we also need to remember our obligation to support our school and parish leadership.

Using technology to support teachers and schools

The Office of Catholic Schools is currently working with schools to pilot a program to support emerging teachers' growth in their instructional and methodological skills set to best serve their students.

The diocese is partnering with one school to test a new software program to address various needs related to parent communication, grading, housing educational resources and financial operations, among many other school information/data related items.

Professional Development Days

In the fall we were able to host our first in-person, diocesanwide professional development day for our school staff since the fall of 2019. It was great to be back in person. The day included Mass, eucharistic adoration and various breakout sessions.

The overall feedback from participants was positive. We are planning additional professional development days this year to allow teachers from across the diocese to collaborate and enrich the student experience.

Marketing + Enrollment







Marketing training and materials

In October, the Office of Catholic Schools, with support from FAITH Catholic and Jolt Credit Union, hosted a marketing training day for all our schools. Principals, parents, alumni, teachers and community members from each school were invited to participate. Best practices related to enrollment practices, websites and marketing were shared. As part of the training, each school received a workbook and posters. Roller shade banners were also provided for each school.

Great Lakes Bay Catholic special schools edition

In January, a special edition of <u>Great Lakes Bay</u> <u>Catholic</u> magazine (formerly *FAITH Saginaw*) was sent to the homes of all registered parishioners throughout the diocese. Each school had one page dedicated to sharing a story or photo collage with quotes from students. The edition also highlighted a great story about a Sacred Heard High School student and his commitment to community service.

Diocesan consumer-facing school website

On Jan. 5, the Office of Catholic Schools unveiled a new consumer-facing <u>website</u> designed as a resource for prospective families. This website includes a listing of all diocesan schools, as well as blog posts and important facts about our schools.

New website opportunity

The digital presence of a school is one of the first things parents review when considering a school. To best support our schools thanks in part to the financial support of Jolt Credit Union, all schools will have the opportunity to update/upgrade their school website for the next three years at no cost.

Ongoing support for schools

School marketing teams have the opportunity to meet regularly with Danielle McGrew Tenbusch, marketing and admissions coordinator, to discuss and review marketing strategies and fine-tune marketing efforts. Regular marketing newsletters and social media resources are also available to support our schools.

Investment in Excellence

The Office of Catholic Schools is working with each school to determine how intentional and targeted investments can ensure excellent Catholic schools. Aspects of this review include staffing levels and compensation, infrastructure needs, academic resources, and other key items. This analysis is based on the *National Standards and Benchmarks of Effective Catholic Schools*. This effort will ensure that there is a common understanding of needs at each location. It will also allow the schools and diocese to work together more closely from a planning and fundraising perspective.

School safety and student well-being

School safety and student well-being are top priorities for our schools. Over the past few months, additional resources have been made available to our schools to support these aspects of our operations.

ALICE Training

The Diocese hosted ALICE safety training in September. Principals and diocesan staff, along with representatives for parishes throughout the diocese, were invited to attended two days of training. Those who attended have the opportunity to become certified ALICE instructors. All schools now have the opportunity to have their staff trained at no cost. ALICE training provides age-appropriate education in how to respond to a potentially violent critical incident.

Updated Code of Conduct for the Diocese of Saginaw

Effective Jan. 1, 2023, the Diocese has updated its polices and requirements related to ensuring a safe environment for minors and/or vulnerable adults. The updated policy requires more ongoing and frequent training.

Behavioral Threat Assessment and Management

Various school leaders and members of the Chancery staff attended training sponsored by the Michigan State Police to help schools identify and address potential threats to school safety. School staff who attended the training stand ready to support all our schools should an assessment be needed. The goals of the assessment is to ensure that student receive the support he or she may need and that the school, with the aid of the assessment team, respond appropriately and promptly to any concerns.

New Suicide and Crisis Lifeline Number is 988

The new nationwide 988 three-digit dialing code will route callers to the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, previously known as the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (NSPL). Users can connect via phone, text, or chat with suicide prevention, mental health, and substance misuse support specialists using a nationwide, easier-to-dial phone number: 988.

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services is asking schools to begin the transition of shifting away from using the former NSPL number on the back of school identifications (IDs), replacing the 800 number with 988. Excellence in Teaching Award returns

The Office of Catholic Schools is pleased to announce the Excellence in Teaching Award for the 2022-23 academic year. This award, made possible through Catholic Community Foundation of Mid-Michigan endowment funds, recognizes and celebrates the positive impact that Catholic School teachers in the Diocese of Saginaw make in the lives of their students, schools and communities. The award also seeks to recognize teachers who exemplify what it means to be a Catholic educator.

Recipients will receive a \$2,500 gift in recognition of their contributions to their school.

Community members are encouraged to nominate the Catholic school teachers who exemplify the traits of an excellent Catholic educator. The selection committee will choose one K-8 teacher (self-contained classroom or specials teacher) and one subject area specialist from grades 7-12, as recipients.
